ANNUAL REPORT

GENTLEMEN,

The year of 1964 was not only Olympic year but also the year of the centenary of the 'Varsity Sports, the oldest dual athletic contest in the world. The sports took place on Saturday 9th May at the White City and resulted in a victory for Cambridge by 80 points to 73. A special souvenir programme was produced in which a wealth of detail was set out. No special medal was struck since the occasion was to be celebrated at the Centenary Dinner in the Christ Church Hall at Oxford on 4th July. Lt.-Colonel A. N. S. Strode-Jackson however kindly presented to the Club a Jubilee Varsity Sports medal for the 50th Contest held in 1913.

The Centenary Celebrations at Oxford started with a Centipede versus Averstone match on the Itfey Road track in the afternoon. This was interspersed by a two-mile race across 'fair hunting country' (as in 1864). Several Old Blues started and for that matter finished. One however, by chance or design, shed a spiked shoe two hundred yards from the start and retired with glory. There was also an Oxford v. Cambridge Old Blue tug-of-war with an indeterminate number of contestants on each side. Cambridge 'judges' officiated to the best of their ability, but despite this the Oxford team won on the final pull.

Inaugurated by all this, the Dinner in Christ Church Hall was celebrated most suitably, with Philip Noel Baker (our President) as Chairman. 'The University Sports' were admirably proposed by Alan Brown (Honorary Treasurer O.U.A.C. 1946-1953) and responded to by The Marquess of Exeter (Vice-President I.O.C.; President I.A.A.F. and Olympic Gold Medalist 1928). The 'Guests' were equally skilfully dealt with by speeches from Lord Milhgan (a former World Record Holder) and by The Dean of Christ Church.

Finally Tom Quad saw a series of races round it up to all hours by Old Blues of almost every vintage. The occasion seemed to be greatly enjoyed by all, and our thanks are due to Charles Wenden and others at Oxford for their successful organisation. The Club is investigating the possibility of holding a similar Dinner at four years intervals, alternatively at Oxford and Cambridge.

The Club again entered teams for the major meetings and is maintaining its high position in British athletics. The Team Manager's Report follows this, and the Club owes a great deal to him and his Assistant Managers for their unremitting efforts. Five members of the Club took part in the Olympic Games in Tokyo, namely J. P. Boulter, J. W. Hogan, A. P. Metcalfe (Silver medal, 4 x 400 m. relay), J. M. Parker, M. Ralph. This year it is hoped that a similar tour may take place in the Midlands under the aegis of John Price.

I would like to thank all those who helped in raising teams throughout the year and to hope that this year, by prompt replies from those asked to take part, the team Managers may have an easier task.

CONSTITUTION AND RULES

OF THE

ACHILLES CLUB

TITLE

1.—The name of the Club shall be the "ACHILLES CLUB."

OBJECTS.

2.—The objects of the Club are:—

- (a) To encourage athletics among members of the O.U.A.C. and C.U.A.C. after they leave the University, and to provide them with suitable training grounds, accommodation and coaching.
- (b) To enter teams for the A.A.A. Relay Championships and at open meetings, thereby providing the opportunity for past and present members of the O.U.A.C. and C.U.A.C. to compete together.
- (c) To encourage relay and team racing.
- (d) To organise international track and field matches with Commonwealth and foreign Universities and teams.
- (e) To arrange athletic matches with the public schools.

MEMBERSHIP QUALIFICATION.

3.—The following shall be eligible as candidates for membership of the Club:—

- (1) All "Blues" and "Half-Blues" of the O.U.A.C., C.U.A.C. and C.U.H. & H.; and Relay and Field Events colours.
- (2) Present Members of the O.U.A.C., C.U.A.C. and C.U.H. & H. who shall be nominated by the Committees of the O.U.A.C. and C.U.A.C. respectively, and shall not exceed more than 12 in number from each in any one year, other than "Blues," "Half-Blues" and Relay Colours.
- (3) Any past member of the University of Oxford or Cambridge, who has rendered distinguished services to athletics. Such members shall be Honorary Life Members of the Club, and shall not be liable to pay any subscription.

SUBSCRIPTIONS PAYABLE.

- 4.—(1) The Club entry fee, paid in one sum on election, shall be three guineas.
- (2) The Annual subscription, due on the 1st May each year, starting on 1st May following election, shall be one guinea payable by Bankers Orders (or the equivalent) to be completed at the time of election.
- (3) As an alternative to (1) and (2) above a new member may pay a life subscription of 20 guineas.
- (4) New members shall not wear the Club Colours or represent the Club until they have fulfilled the financial conditions of joining the Club.

ADMISSION OF MEMBERS.

5.—Admission of Members, other than Honorary Members, shall be by election of the Committee, but the Committee shall have the power to delegate to the Committees of the O.U.A.C. and C.U.A.C. the right to elect.

Honorary Members shall be elected at a General Meeting, on the recommendation of the Committee.

SUBSCRIPTION IN ARREARS.

6.—Attention is drawn to Law 19 of the Amateur Athletic Association. This Rule is incorporated in the Constitution and Rules of the Club.

CONSTITUTION OF COMMITTEE.

7.—The general management of the Club shall be delegated to a General Committee consisting of a Chairman and six Members who shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting. The Chairman shall hold office for one year, but shall be eligible for re-election. Members of the Committee shall hold office for three years and two members shall retire annually by rotation but shall not be eligible for re-election for at least one year. In addition thereto the Presidents, Honorary Treasurers, Honorary Secretaries and the immediate Past-Presidents of the O.U.A.C. and C.U.A.C., and the Achilles undergraduate representative in each university, shall be *ex-officio* Members of the Committee. The Committee shall have power to fill any casual vacancy which may occur in its Membership in the intervals between Annual General Meetings.

FINANCE.

8.—The Committee shall be empowered to borrow monies for the use of the Club up to the value of the assets of the Club.

CO-OPTED MEMBERS OF COMMITTEE.

9.—The Committee shall have power to co-opt additional Members, but there shall not be more than five co-opted Members on the Committee at any one time.

APPOINTMENT OF OFFICIALS.

10.—The Committee shall appoint an Honorary Treasurer and an Honorary Secretary, both of whom shall be *ex-officio* Members of the Committee and shall hold office at the will of the Committee. The Committee may appoint any other officers of the Club they deem necessary, but they shall not be *ex-officio* Members of the Committee.

COMMITTEE QUORUM.

11.—At Committee Meetings five shall form a quorum.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, ELECTION OF OFFICE BEARERS AND COMMITTEE.

12.—There shall be an Annual General Meeting of the Members of the Club at least once a year to be held upon a date and at a time to be fixed by the Committee, for the following purposes:—

- (a) To receive from the Committee the Report, Balance Sheet and Statement of Accounts for the preceding financial year.
- (b) To elect the President and Vice-Presidents of the Club who shall hold office for one year.
- (c) To elect the Chairman and the Members of the Committee and to appoint Auditors for the ensuing year.

NOTICE NECESSARY FOR ANNUAL MEETING.

13.—Notice of the Annual General Meeting shall be sent to every Member of the Club at least 15 days before it is held.

DATE OF GIVING NOTICE OF RESOLUTIONS.

14.—Any Member desirous of moving any resolution at the Annual General Meeting shall give notice thereof in writing to the Honorary Secretary, not less than 10 days before the date of such meeting.

SPECIAL GENERAL MEETINGS.

15.—The Committee may, at any time, on giving not less than seven days' notice, call an Extraordinary General Meeting. They shall also do so forthwith upon the requisition in writing of any fifteen Members stating the purpose for which the meeting is required.

ALTERATION OF RULES.

16.—These Rules shall only be altered at a General Meeting of the Club by a vote of at least two-thirds of those present and voting.

A VERY ABBREVIATED ACCOUNT OF SOME HAPPENINGS DURING THE LIFE OF THE CLUB 1920-1965

1920
After World War 1, on 27th March, 1920, the Achilles Club was founded after the Blues Dinner at Oddemno's Restaurant.

Bevil Rudd writes later... "In 1912, at the Olympic Games the idea of a joint Oxford and Cambridge Club was discussed by P. J. Noel-Baker, G. R. L. Anderson, K. Powell, A. N. S. Strode-Jackson and A. E. D. Anderson, all of whom were in the British Team, in 1914, this idea had taken shape and it was decided to form the new Club in 1915."

"But G. R. L. Anderson and K. Powell were killed in the War and it was left to the three survivors to renew this project at the end of 1919. I was included in their deliberations with a view to organising the initial activities of the Club."

The Club organised the first British Empire v. U.S.A. match on 4th September at Queen's Club, resulting in a profit of £1,500. At the Olympic Games in Antwerp, Guy Butler, J. C. Ainsworth-Davis and Bevil Rudd won gold medals.

1924
Twenty-four members were in the Olympic team for Paris. The victors were H. M. Abraham (100 m.) and D. G. A. Lowe (800 m.). Philip Noel-Baker (1920 silver medalist and 1959 Nobel Peace Prize winner) was Team Captain.

1925
Public School Relay meeting was continued. The Achilles Trophy was presented for the Inter-Counties Championship.

1926
Matches against the newly formed Ayalanta Club in Scotland and against All-Ireland, Seven A.A.A. titles gained. Club blazer with gannet cuffs and gun metal buttons was approved.

1927
The Annual Report states "There is a very strong feeling, prevalent among other athletic clubs, that the Achilles is now so strong that its participation in competitions is discouraging other clubs, and so definitely having a bad influence on athletics as a whole."
Tours to Greece, Ireland/Scotland and to Germany. The Club membership was 357 (nearly 1,200 in 1965).

1928
Twenty-two members competed in Olympic Games in Amsterdam. D. G. A. Lowe (800 m.) and Lord Burghley (400 m. hurdles) won gold medals. Match against Waseda University, Japan.

1929
The Sports moved from Queen's Club to Stamford Bridge. Public School Relays no longer staged. First South African tour and matches against All-Ireland and Wales.

1930
Second tour to Greece. Four A.A.A. titles, and Lord Burghley won both the Harvey and Jackson Memorial Cups; twenty-one members at 'Empire Games' in Hamilton. Lord Burghley won the 120 and 440 yards hurdles, T. Hampson 880 yards, M. C. Nokes the Hammer, and three members (R. Leigh Wood, H. S. Townsend and Lord Burghley) were in the winning 4 x 440 yards team. Seven gold, five silver and two bronze medals were won.
An attempt to change the Club's "Old Gold" tie is foiled at the A.G.M.

1931
D. G. A. Lowe was elected Honorary Secretary A.A.A. Sixth consecutive victory in the Kinnaird Trophy. Match in Antwerp and "Jolly matches" against Sussex and Essex.

1932
Move from Stamford Bridge to White City track. Six members were in Great Britain's Olympic team, Los Angeles, producing two gold medalists, T. Hampson 800 m. in world record 1m. 49.7 secs. and R. M. N. Tisdall (Ireland) 400 m. hurdles. Four A.A.A. titles won. First failure to win one of the A.A.A. relay titles since 1925. The Club competed in the Kinnaird as Achilles (Oxford) and Achilles (Cambridge) coming respectively second and third to the London Athletic Club.

1933
School Tours became more motorised. Achilles Ball first organised after Varsity Sports. Jack Lovelock broke world's record for one mile with 4 m. 7.6 secs. in Princeton Bowl, U.S.A. Achilles competed as one team in Kinnaird and won.

1934
First Scandinavian tour, and team in Antwerp. Alec Nelson, C.U.A.C. coach, retired. Second "Empire Games" in London. Jack Lovelock (mile) and M.C. Nokes (Hammer) won gold medals, and three Club members (D. I. Rathbone, J. C. Stothard, E. I. Davis) were in winning relay teams; two silver, four bronze medals also.

1935 Teams to Antwerp and Paris. Second South African tour. Three gold medalists in International Student Games in Budapest—J. C. Stohard (800 m.), J. E. Lovelock (1,500 m.) and P. D. Ward (5,000 m.) Club defeated Yugoslavia team in Zagreb; Club presented trophy to H.M.S. Achilles.

1936 Round Paris relay race. Eleven members in Berlin Olympic Games. Jack Lovelock (N.Z.) won gold medal (1,500 m.), and A. G. K. Brown gold for 4 x 400 m. relay, and silver medal in 400 m. with 46.7 secs.

1937 Kinaird Trophy won for 14th time in 18 contests. First Achilles Book "Athletics" published.

1938 Points scoring in Varsity Sports substituted for events scoring. Five A.A.A. titles, six seconds and three thirds. Three members in Sydney "Empire Games"—K. S. Duncan, England captain. F. I. Frebrace again deputises for Evan Hunter (Honorary Secretary) during his absence abroad with teams.

1939-1945 World War II—over 50 members killed on active service. War time Varsity Sports held alternately at Oxford and Cambridge.

1946 Club re-started after the War. Combined O.U.A.C./C.U.A.C. team defeated A.A.A. by 68 to 58 points. Varsity Sports at White City, but no Achilles Ball started.

1947 Kinaird trophy won. Eight members act as coaches at Loughborough Summer School. German Tour. Five gold and two silver medals won at the International Student Games (Paris).

1948 Evening matches in London arranged in long vacation. Nine members in Great Britain's Olympic team at Wembley. Three A.A.A. titles, including 4 x 110 yards sprint relay.

1949 More than 100 members at A.G.M. pay tribute to Evan Hunter on his retirement as Honorary Secretary after 25 years service. First annual Report was issued without the names and addresses of members. The full Report to be printed each Olympic year. New edition of Achilles Book, still on techniques and training for events. U.S.A. match series and Achilles Ball were re-started. Achilles medals to be given annually for the best performances by a club member in track events and in field events. Bill Thomas (O.U.A.C. Coach) retired from all coaching having been succeeded at Oxford from 1945-49 by K. S. Duncan as Honorary Coach. Four lap to the mile track built at Hfley Road, Oxford.

1950 Third Greek tour; Pan-Hellenic team was defeated by twelve events to six in Athens. Three members in Auckland "Empire Games" in which I. D. Anderson wins pole vault.

1951 Fourteen members in International Students Games (Luxembourg) with three gold and five silver medals. The Annual Report states "Despite the high level mark in Varsity Sports performances, the athletic standard throughout the country is rising even more rapidly and no longer can the Club expect to triumph so frequently".

1952 Eight members in Great Britain's Olympic team at Helsinki.

1953 Attempts made to obtain revision of the A.A.A. First Claim Rule without success. Eighth U.S.A. tour, but Harvard was replaced by West Point, and Princeton by Pennsylvania. Officers of A.A.A. Coaching Committee were M. C. Nokes, R.St. G. T. Harper and K. S. Duncan.

1954 Roger Bannister ran first mile inside four minutes (3 min. 59.4 s.) at Hfley Road, Oxford. Chris Chataway beat Russian Kuits in world record 5,000 metres in London v. Moscow floodlit meeting at White City. Eleven members in "Empire Games" Vancouver, gained five gold, one silver and three bronze medals, including Bannister's "Mile of the Century" win over Australia's Landy in 3 min. 38.8 sec. Belgian tour.

The Report states "The impact of the seemingly carefree approach of the Club had . . . nor for that matter is the seemingly carefree approach of the Varsity athlete fully understood, who still along with others retains the capacity of enjoying his sport, and can yet turn out world performances. Athletics is developing fast in this country, and we have yet to find how the Club can best fit into the new pattern".

1955 Five A.A.A. titles; Chataway three mile world record. The Evan Hunter, E. A. Montagne and Bevil Rudd Trophy presented for the A.A.A. 220 yards low hurdles. Varsity Sports postponed because of frost, for the first time since 1896. Second Scandinavian tour to Sweden and Norway.

1956 Varsity Sports held in April. Seven members in Olympic Games, Melbourne. Chris Brasher won gold medal in the 3,000 m. steeplechase and Derek Johnson the silver for 800 m. Third Scandinavian tour to Sweden and Denmark.

1957 Varsity Sports held in April. Ninth Oxford/Cambridge American tour. Both matches won, followed by seven members winning nine Canadian titles in Montreal.

1958 Varsity Sports reverted to March. Milton Road track replaced Fenmers at Cambridge. Thirteen members took part in "Empire Games" in Cardiff. "Modern Athletics" published by the Club no longer a coaching manual.

1959 Varsity Sports held in May. Tour to Sweden. Ivar Viind joins The Margness of Exeter and Sir Arthur Forritt as a member of the International Olympic Committee.

1960 May date for Varsity Sports firmly established. Four members competed at the Olympic Games in Rome. Alternative Club "Dress Tie" approved. Re-organisation of the administration of the Club with additional Team Managers and an Achilles Representative at each University.

1961 Nine members competed in the International University Games in Sofia. American tour, and eight Canadian titles won later in Montreal.

1962 Four members took part in the European Championships in Belgrade, and two in the "Empire Games" in Perth, Western Australia.

1963
Kinraid and Sward Trophies won. The Achilles School Relays instituted. Rates of subscription for new members were changed and all old members asked to support the Club with an annual subscription.

1964
Four members in Olympic Games, Tokyo (one silver medal). A Metcalfe established record of nine victories in Varsity Sports during his undergraduate career.
