PORTRAIT OF THE YEAR

January

Luke Caldwell made a magnificent marathon debut with a time of 2:11:33 in Houston. At the same meeting Matt Leach ran 63:29 for the half marathon. Tom Frith and Jamie Edgerton became cross-country champions of Essex and Cambridgeshire respectively. Indoors, Eleanor Bolton ran 16:09.84 for 5000m, Rowan May and Jake Watson both cleared 4.91, and Kaesi Opara ran 6.90 for 60m. Andy Heyes won the Farnborough half marathon in 64:17. Jack Millar was 5th in the Northern Ireland Cross Challenge.

February

Eleanor Bolton won the Northern Cross Country: Jack Millar was 3rd in the Midlands, Andy Heyes 5th in the

Northern, and Tom Frith 5th in the Southerns. Indoors at Glasgow, Sam Clarke ran 49.01 for 400m and moved to 4th on the Achilles al time list at 60mH with 8.04; Kaesi Opara improved on 6.90 the previous month with a new 60m PB of 6.87; Jake Watson vaulted 5.06, with Rowan May on 4.86; and Louise Shanahan opened her 800m season with 2:05.29. At BUCS indoors, Jake Watson was crowned champion (with a 5.10m PB), as was Louise Shanahan at 800m; and Jeremy Dempsey finished 4th in a competitive 3000m. Eleanor Bolton rounded off the month with 2nd in the National Cross Country, ahead of Nancy Scott (11th), Niamh Bridson Hubbard (16th), Naomi Taschimowitz (25th) and Bethanie Murray (30th). In the men's race Jack Millar was a fine 5th. At the National Indoors, a 15.91 PB took Jude Bright-Davies to bronze in the triple jump.

March

The Varsity Field Events and relays were held at Lee Valley (see separate report). Dan Bray won silver in the V35 200m at the BMAF Championships, as did Bo Ivanovic in the V80 shot with 9.61.

April

Andy Heyes made his marathon debut in Manchester finishing 5th (3rd Brit) in 2:13:52, leading to his selection alongside Luke Caldwell for the European Championships in August: Will Mycroft was 11th in a PB of 2:17:02, Alex Milne 13th in a PB of 2:17:53, Tom Frith 2:19:44 on debut in 22nd and Luke Cotter 25th in 2:23:09, also on debut. Eleanor Bolton paced the Elite Women. At Stanford in the US, Matt Leach ran 28:34.04 for 10000m and might have PB'd but for a lap miscount. At the same meeting Angus Harrington, Harry Cox and Jeremy Dempsey all made their outdoor debuts, the former two with 800s of 1:50.40 and 1:52.05 respectively and the latter with a 3:43.49 1500m. Chris McGurk won the Southampton marathon in 2:30:17.

May

At BUCS, Jack Paget won the hammer on his final throw with 63.00.Oxford's women took an inspired bronze in the 4 x 400m. At the Varsity Match (see separate report) the women's match was tied, and Cambridge won the men's; Oxford won both second team matches. The following week a dinner was held at the Randolph Hotel for Dai Roberts. Louise Shanahan set an Irish 800m record of 1:59.42. At the Loughborough international Jack Paget progressed to an Achilles record of 67.79; Angus Harrington (800m 1:50.51 PB) and Jude Bright-Davies (Triple Jump 16.18 PB) were event winners; Maranga Mokaya set a 400mh PB, 52.12. At the Night of 10000m PBs, Oliver Fox ran 29:25.21; and Eleanor Bolton 33:49.27; with

good runs too by Joseph Massingham and Alex Bampton. In America, Luke Caldwell set a 10000m PB of 28:18.13; and at the East Regionals, Charlotte Dannatt qualified for the NCAA finals at 10000m. Louise Shanahan ran 2:01.35 at th Diamond League at Birmingham. At the BMC Grand Prix in Manchester Angus Harrington won the A 800m in big PB of 1:48.58.

June

At the NCAA divisionals in Eugene Charlotte Dannatt ran a 10000m PB of 33:26.78 (and in a chance encounter of former opposing OUAC and CUAC Presidents bumped into Cara James)

At the Southern Championships Maranga Mokaya won the 400mH and set anew PD 51.16 in the heats; Kaesi Opara set an new 100m PB of 10.6- (+1.7) and secured bronze in the final with 10.53 (+2.5). At the UK Championships Maranga went even faster, reaching the final with 50.48 and securing 4th place; Jude Bright-Davies was 2nd in the triple jump with 16.10, ahead of Sam Trigg-Petrovic in 4th place in his farewell season ;Niamh Bridson Hubbard placed 7th in the 1500m.

July

Josh Carr became the Club's first four minute mile since Andy Baddeley with 3:58.97 in Birmingham. Simon Baines became V50 World Masters Champion at half marathon in 1:11:34. At the National U23 Championships Sam Clarke set a 400mH PB of 51.37 in finishing an agonisingly close 2nd; Brad Burke place 5th in the combined 3000mS/C but won gold as first U23; Adam Dray was 4th in the U20 800m in a PB of 1:51.64; Esther Leong 4th in the U23 Pole Vault; Phoebe Baggott 4th in the U23 Hammer in 56.65m; and Rowan Burford was 5th in the U23 Javelin. At the BMC meeting in Trafford Niamh Bridson Hubbard

finished a strong 2nd in a PB of 4:14.1. Veteran Dan Bray set a 49.26 400m PB at the age of 38.

August

Many members decamped to Monaco (see separate report). At the Commonwealth Games in Manchester we were well represented, albeit mainly by officials The brains behind the very successful European Championships in Munich were Paul Bristow's; a delighted Louise Shanahan reached the final of the 800m; Andy Heyes will have been disappointed not to be able to repeat his early season form and was 44th in the marathon; Luke Caldwell failed to finish. Niamh Bridson Hubbard moved to 3rd on the Achilles alltime 1500m lists with 4:12.42. At the England Championships, Jude Bright-Davies rounded off the year by winning the triple jump; Jack Paget placed 2nd in the hammer; Alexandra Shipley was 4th in the 1500m; Maranga Mokaya was 4th in the 400mH. Jake Watson while recovering from a vaulting injury showed great speed with a 10.79/21.87 sprint double. Alex Gruen ran 3:45.24 when winning a BMC race at Trafford. Adam Dray ran 1:49.41 for 800m, and Ben Waterman 1:50.3

September

Jon Ridgeon was inducted in to the England Athletics Hall of fame, joining David Hemery, Roger Bannister, Chris Brasher, Harold Abrahams, David Burghley, Tom Hampson, Chris Chataway, Douglas Lowe, Guy Butler, Godfrey Brown, Derek Johnson and Peter Matthews.

Achilles are extremely proud that Peter has been recognised in the New Year's Honours.

One of the most senior officials in the country, he has officiated at countless events from grassroots up to the 2012 Olympic Games (*right*). As an administrator Peter is a former Chair of London Regional Council and recently retired from 8 years on the England Athletics Board.

From our own perspective, Peter was the Varsity Match winner at 400m in 1974. He was a member of the Oxford and Cambridge team who toured the USA in 1973 and during the mid 1970s he was Achilles Team Manager at a time when the Club was holding their own in the National League.

From 1987 he has been our Honorary Secretary. He undertook the huge task of computerising our membership records, and has been meticulous in keeping track of members and their addresses. Peter was on the management team of the Achilles tour to Hong Kong and China in 1991 and of the Oxford and Cambridge team to USA in 1995.

Other members recently recognised for services to sport include **Dame Sarah Springman** and **Mick Bromilow BEM.**



Roger Robinson notes: -

'Great news from New York Road Runners is the appointment of **Nnenna Lynch** as Chair of the Board, taking up that key role next June. The media releases rightly emphasise Nnenna's recent work as advisor to the Mayor of New York City, but I first knew her as a Rhodes Scholar at Oxford, when she was coached by my old friend **Bruce Tulloh**. She won the 5000m in the World Universiade 1997, and

won the US cross-country trial 1998, representing USA at the world championships. The "semiretired" Nnenna ran the 2002 New York City Marathon in 2:55:15, looking the class athlete she is. Twenty years later, in the Mastercard New York Mini 10K, she ran 40:26 at age 50, third in her agegroup. After Oxford, she committed to a career in the non-profit area, and will now chair one of the world's most important non-profit organizations.'





After teaching at Felsted School he became Head of Department of Medical Physics at Royal Perth Hospital in Australia

Dr John Watt (University College, Oxford, 1931-33) on 29th October 1996.

A Rhodes Scholar alongside Jack Lovelock, JS Watt competed in the half mile at the Varsity Sports of 1933. A distinguished career in industry culminated in chairmanship of New Zealand Oil and Gas.

Professor James Mahoney (Balliol College, Oxford 1929-32) in 1997.

A Rhodes Scholar, JC Mahoney trained and competed alongside Jerry Cornes, and competed in the mile at the Varsity Sports of 1932. He pursued a varied career in senior posts at his original alma mater, the University of Queensland

Alexander Kennedy (Pembroke College, Cambridge 1936-39) on 12th June 1999

Alick Kennedy competed in the Varsity Relays 4 x 440y. After a distinguished war in the Navy he managed the family dyeing business.

Niels Bugge (Pembroke College, Cambridge 1926-29) in 2000.

John Wyatt-Smith

(Wadham College, Oxford 1935 -9 and 1947-8) on 30th October 2002

JS Wyatt-Smith was in the victorious team at the 1938 Varsity Cross Country, placing 8th, and placed 3rd in the 3 miles at the 1939 Varsity Sports. He became a pioneer of rainforest regeneration in South East Asia.

Dr Robert Percival FRCS KStJ (St John's College, Oxford,

1934-38) in June 2004

RH Percival competed in the Varsity Cross Country of 1935 and 1936, in the mile at the Varsity Sports of 1937, and in the 3 miles in 1938. He became a consultant surgeon at West Kent Hospital.

Desmond Stratton

(Magdalene College, Cambridge, 1945-48) on 16th November 2009

DW Stratton was 4th in the mile at the Varsity Sports of 1946 (Tommy Macpherson was 3rd) and 6th in 1947 (Roger Bannister won)

Dr John Mailtand

(Emmanuel College, Cambridge 1952-5) on 21st June 2013.

JM Maitland competed in the 120y hurdles at the Varsity Sports of 1954. After qualifying as a GP he devoted much of his life to charitable work in Uganda

Alex Horsley (Worcester

College, Oxford, 1962-65) on 1st December 2011



MA Horsley emigrated to the USA and was founding headmaster of Atlanta International School .

Rev. David Shiress (St Catharine's College, Cambridge, 1946-49 and Ridley Hall 1951-53) on 9th December 2013.

DHF Shiress competed in the mile at the 1948 Varsity Sports. He was also a Hockey Blue.

Robert Winser (Corpus Christi College, Oxford, 1940-41) on 20th December 2013.



RH Winser won the javelin at the Wartime Varsity Sports of 1941. He became a District Commissioner in Kenya.



John Young (St Edmund Hall, Oxford, 1956-60) on 19 March 2020

JRC Young competed in the 1957 Varsity Sports as a freshman. For the subsequent 3 years he dominated the 100y, winning on each occasion, also competing in some years in the 220y and the long jump. He was also a Rugby Blue.

The Times recorded that he "played rugby for England, had a walk-on part in the Profumo affair and would cook family meals in the nude.

"John Young belonged to the pantheon of sportsmen who scored tries or centuries for fun, partied without concern for curfews, had a sense of mischief and went to bed just before breakfast.



"He would appear at an AAA match in black tie, clutching a bottle of champagne. Then he would strip into his running kit, win the race and polish off the bubbly next to his father's Bentley.

"Young had more than a tangential link to the runners glamorised in the film Chariots of Fire. Like Eric Liddell, he won the AAA 100-yards, in his case in 9.9 seconds in 1956: he was 18 and was referred to by the commentator in the Pathé news film as 'an unknown schoolboy'."

The Rev Dr George Dole

(University College, Oxford 1952-54) on 29th June 2021. George F Dole won the mile (photo) at the Varsity Sports of 1954 in 4:15.2. He dined out on being 'last in the first' behind Roger Bannister in the four minute mile a few weeks later.

A graduate of Yale, he had placed 3rd for Harvard & Yale against Oxford & Cambridge in London in 1951.

He loved to remember his running days, and continued to 'run around the block' for as long as he could.



Marion Stevenson. February 20, 1930 – April 25, 2022

Marion first contacted us about twenty years ago: she had been inspired by the movie Chariots of Fire and her genealogical interests led her to seek out the families of Harold Abrahams and the other characters depicted. This led to much interesting correspondence with them and the Club, and a friendship which encompassed meetings on many occasions both in England and in the US. Although she had no particular interest in the sport per se, she became a staunch supporter of the Achilles Club, who made her an honorary member.

Dr David Donaldson (Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, 1953-57) on 20th February 2022.

The Achilles Schools Relays is an enduring legacy of which David was justly proud.

DW Donaldson was President of CUAC in 1957, and Hon Sec the year before, and in both posts his Oxford counterpart was Donald Gorrie at Oxford. After going down, and reflecting the careers in teaching on which they had both embarked, after several years on the Achilles Club committee he and Donald joined forces to found Achilles Schools Relays. The first meeting was held at Iffley Road on the 8th June 1963, with 21 schools represented and Adrian Metcalfe as referee. The Achilles Schools Relays has remained a prominent and prestigious schools fixture ever since, and is currently directed by Lucy Spray. The Club has given a trophy this



year for a new event, the mixed 4 x 400m.

David specialised in the 220y hurdles, and competed in the Varsity Sports of 1954, 1956 and 1957. His best time for the event, 24.3 at Fenners on 7th May 1957, ranks 13th on the CUAC all-time lists. He was a captain of the Oxford and Cambridge team which toured the USA in 1957 (photo). And in 1974 he chaired the post Varsity Match dinner.

David became a highly regarded and progressive headmaster of Kimbolton School, overseeing the construction of a science block and the admission for the first time of girls. He retained a close interest in the Achilles Club throughout his life.

David's own account of setting up the Achilles Schools Relays:-

'The competition came about from an idea that I floated to the Club Committee. It did not get unanimous approval, and it was Tommy Macpherson's backing which carried the day. When Donald Gorrie went to Marlborough and became i/c athletics in 1960, I proposed to him that he should seek support from the schools Marlborough competed against, and I undertook to do the same for the Stowe contacts. We found that there was quite sufficient enthusiasm to set up a meeting at Iffley Road - a geographically convenient track for the schools on our combined fixture list who promised to take part. It was a success and the meeting grew in stature in succeeding years. I ran the meeting until the mid-70s and then handed over to Tim Taylor who oversaw continued success. There were medals, but no cups, awarded in 1963, but with the help of Tommy and Sandy Duncan we had fun raiding the Club's store of cups to produce some trophies in 1964.'



Tim Lintott (Christ's College, Cambridge 1971-74) on 12th August 2022

TD Lintott was 2nd in the Varsity Sports discus in 1972 ahead of his first string, John Gosden, and 4th in the shot. He was 4th in the discus in 1973, and 3rd in the shot in 1974, and represented Oxford & Cambridge on the tour to the USA in 1973. CUAC's redoubtable coach Roy Carter reckoned he had the most flexible back which he had ever encountered. Tim was even more formidable on the Rugby pitch: he toured Rhodesia with CURFC in 1974 where fellow double Blue, sprinter Dave Williams, recalls that he scored more tries from the pack than Dave did on the wing.

Tim was an Achilles stalwart who never refused a request for assistance. Notably he took on the catering arrangements for the 1995 Guildhall Banquet.

A kinder and more amiable person you could not hope to meet.





That the discus was only one of many sports where he showed power and talent meant that those around him held him in special regard - rugby, athletics to be followed by golf and real tennis . Tim was self effacing and charming throughout, and a very special team companion especially on tours: competitive, but always teamly supportive, and apres the skirmishes invariably the most entertaining and gracious gentleman. A special friend over many decades.

Paul Orchart (CUAC President 1974)

Lt Col John Ellicock OBE (Emmanuel College, Cambridge, 1969-72) on 13 May 2022

JH Ellicock added 2cm to match record in the high jump at the Varsity Sports of 1971, 2.02m (only 6cm off the UK record), winning again in 1972, when he was CUAC President. He also recorded two 2nd places in the pole vault and the high hurdles

Champion athlete, super-fit hill-climber and long-distance walker, decorated soldier and leader in business, graduate of Sandhurst and Cambridge (engineering), tireless worker, supporter and benefactor of Army retirees, schools and endangered birds of prey, top executive at Castrol-Burmah, dedicated husband, father and grandfather – the unique John Ellicock.

I met John in 1970, in Cambridge, as a fellow high-jumper, and liked him immediately. Within days of meeting, we invited him to dinner, which he accepted if he could bring his girlfriend, Wendy, to whom he was been married for almost 50 years. We cherished a close friendship ever since -Neville Norman

John was a tremendous guy. I well recall his speech at the 1972 VM dinner at the Café Royal.. I remember too in my early days as Achilles Hon Treasurer receiving a moving letter from John when he was Garrison Commander at Crossmaglen during the darkest days of the Troubles.

Michael's most successful year on the track was 1955, when he won his Blue at 440 yards against Oxford, with Cecil Parkinson his second string, and then set a personal best time of 48.8 secs on the Achilles tour to Scandinavia which Robert Stinson had organised.

Another generation of members will remember with gratitude his hosting of the 1991 Achilles Ball (left).



Adrian Metcalfe

Further to the tributes published last year, **Jeffrey Archer** reflects:

Adrian was best man at my wedding (see photograph), and you'll notice that other great quarter miler of the day, Wendell Mottley, president of Cambridge, was an usher.

I first saw Adrian running in the English Schools Championships in 1957 when he hit the headlines day after day, and we all realised we were in the presence of a remarkable talent. As Michael Beloff pointed out, he would surely have won the gold medal in the Olympic Games if it



had been a year earlier, when he won the American Championships when he beat Mike Larrabee who went on to win the gold.

It's also worth mentioning that in Olympic year, Adrian was badly injured and only just recovered in time to go to the Tokyo games. When I asked the Olympic skipper, Robbie Brightwell why Adrian had been chosen when he wasn't at his best, Brightwell simply replied, "If we get to the 4x400m final, I want him in the team. He still has the ability to pull out a leg that will guarantee a medal". How right he was.

The thing I most remember about Adrian was his beauty – there is no other word – on the track, when he looked like a gazelle as he headed to the line.

He was also a wonderful friend in good times and bad, and anyone who had the privilege of knowing him will miss him.

Geoff Reynolds

(St John's College, Cambridge 1954-57) in August 2020.

GW Reynolds pole vaulted for CUAC. His son Antony was a rowing Blue.

Weight training, in its infancy in the 1950s, was championed by CUAC's legendary coach, Allan Malcolm. His methods were revolutionary enough to provoke interest from other quarters, so the photo below left appeared in a rather niche body building magazine (to the hilarity of Reynolds family ever since) with the caption *"Reynolds uses weights to build stamina and endurance for this most difficult of field events. 
Bill Young (Clare College, Cambridge, 1938-9 and 1946-7) on 12th June 2013.

GS Jones was 2nd in the pole vault at the Varsity Sports of 1954

Tony Maltby (St John's College, Cambridge, 1947-51) on 18th May 2019.




AJ Maltby competed in the discus at the Varsity Sports of 1948, 1949, 1950 and 1951. He became a successful Headmaster of Trent College.

Prof Simon Maddrell (St

Catharine's College, Cambridge, 1956-62, and a Fellow of Caius College 1964-2020), on 10th September 2020.



SHP Maddrell was also a table tennis Half Blue. He was Emeritus Honorary Professor of Integrative Physiology at the Department of Zoology. **Desmond Luke** (Keble College, Oxford, 1954-58 and Magdalene College, Cambridge, 959-61) on 27th February 2021.



DEF Luke won the Varsity Sports long jump in 1956 and was 2nd in 1957: he also competed in the high jump each year from 1955 to 1958.

He represented Oxford & Cambridge in both events on the 1957 US tour.

We most recently saw Desmond during the London Olympics, when by happy chance he was staying at the venue where the Club was holding its celebrations.

He became a barrister in Sierra Leone, and thereafter a politician rising to Foreign Secretary and then Minister for Health.


Dr JD Scarr (Queens' College, Cambridge 1963-6) in November 2021.

John Scarr placed second to Jeffrey Archer in the Oxford v Cambridge Freshmen's sports in 1963. That may have been the only time he beat his team mate Peter Ashiki Egom, who went on to set a new Varsity Match record in 1966, with John placing 4th.

Cecil "Pip" Piper (Queens' College, Cambridge,1946-48) on the 19th October 2022

Pip Piper placed 3rd in the 440y at the Varsity Sports of 1947 and 1948. On both occasions the race was won by Peter Wallis: in 1947 2nd was John Mark, who next year lit the Olympic flame; in 1948 Pip was first Cambridge athlete, behind also the 1949 winner and long time Achilles Hon Treasurer Derek Steel. Pip also competed for Achilles v Polytechnic Harriers and others.

(University College, Oxford, 1953-56) on 12th January 2019.

Martin Thouless (Jesus College, Oxford 1950-53) on December 12, 2021

MH Thouless placed 2nd to John Lyons in the 1953 Varsity pole vault .

Lenton Allpress (St Catharine's College, Cambridge, 1956-59) on 18 November 2021.

Damien Knight (Exeter College, Oxford, 1962-65) on 24th April 2022.

DK Knight competed in the 220y hurdles (placing 2nd) 120y hurdles and the triple jump in the 1964 Varsitry Sports, and placed 2nd again in the 220y hiurdles in 1965. He lost oot to Jeffrey Archer in the OUAC presidential election.

AS Akiwumi JSC (St John's College, Cambridge, 1947-49) in 1985

Augustus Akimumi competed in the high jump in the 1949 Varsity Sports. He became a barrister, Supreme Court Judge, and Speaker of the Parliament of Ghana.

Over 70 Achilles members travelled to Monaco on a short August trip, masterminded by Léa Wenger, timed to coincide with the Monaco Diamond League.

40 YEARS ON...

OUAC, CUAC AND ACHILLES IN 1982

OUAC President Christopher Humphry reflects:-

The 1981 match had been a close affair and Oxford were the favourites, so we were definitely looking for revenge. As it happened, the 1982 varsity match ended up being a bit of a disaster for the Oxford men's team. We were soundly beaten by a superior Cambridge team - with Trevor Llewelyn, Trevor Burton, Carson Porteous, Simon Keenlyside, Stuart Moore, and John Hemery all in sparkling form. Their 4x400 record 3.16.0 (Llewelyn 50.7, Keenlyside 48.3, Burton, Hemery 48.9) was truly exciting. The Cambridge Ladies were also magnificent with some excellent performances from Sue Parker, Sue Dalgoutte, Sarah Owen, Amma Kyei-Mensah - a real powerhouse team. It was, as you know, a complete clean sweep for Cambridge with Alverstone getting the better of the Centipedes by 3 points.

The high-points from the Oxford side were our sprinters with David Burn, Dominic Emery, and throwers with Paddy Mbu, Tony Best, Veijo Miihkinen and Ian Jackson - all in terrific form. The low points were many.

For me the stand out Oxford performance was Jackie Roynon beating the Ladies 100m record with 12.6 - the previous record set by Bridget Wheeler was thought untouchable.

Personally, I've blocked out the memories of that year - I have far more vivid and positive ones for 1981, 1984, and the US trip in 1981. Looking back with a bit of perspective, Cambridge had an amazing team composed of several international athletes (Porteous, Llewelyn, Burton, Owen, Dalgoutte, et al) and a superb supporting cast. But for a weakness on the throws on the men's side, the result would have been even worse for Oxford.

A major women's fixture hosted by Achilles and organised by **Bridget Wheeler** was held at Southwark Park. Although we had no individual winners, in a match littered with prospective or hopeful Commonwealth Games competitors, there were notable performances from **Bridget Wheeler** (l00m, 12.1, 2nd; 200m, 24.8, 3rd), **Sue Parker** (King's, 800, 2m 18.1, 3rd; Mile, 5m 07.8, 3rd), **Kim Wells** (400mH, 62.3, 3rd), **Sarah Owen** (L.J., 5.66, 3rd; H.J., 1.65, 3rd)

At the Crystal Palace men's match against Southern Counties and Combined Services Achilles won in 3:13.23, a time which still in 2022 remains the fastest ever by any Achilles, CUAC or OUAC team: Simon Keenlyside (48.7), Robin Tolson (Jesus, C, 48.7), Trevpr Burton (47.8) and Brian Jones (St. Cath's, C, 48.1). Other wins were Porteous (110mh 14.71) and Llewelyn (H,J., 2m 14), with further notable performances at 400m—Keenlyside 2nd (47.82) and Jones 3rd (48.48)—and 400mH—Burton 2nd (52.90) and Tolson 3rd (53.36). Martin Wilson was helped with team management by

Tony Shiret.

The match against Penn & Cornell at Oxford in mid -June was close fought: we lost the men's match by 9 events to 11, the women's by 7 events to 8. Oxbridge victories went to Sue Dalgoutte (I00mH, 15.01), Jackie Roynon (l00m 12.53, 200m 25.92, 400m 58.11), Gill Suttle (400mH, 63.6) and both women's relay teams; and to Dominic Emery (St. Anne's, 400m 48.5), Hemery (400mH, 53.18), Mark Jackson (1500m, 3m 56.15), Llewelyn (H.J. 2ml0), Patrick Mbu (Discus, 43m 82) Lindon Neil (T.J. 14m06), Carson Porteous (110mH, 14.8), Malcolm Rimmer (5000m, I4m 49.4) and John Stoodley (3000m S/Ch. 9m 05.0—a new match record). "Senior" Achilles women Kim Wells Sarah Owen and Bridget Wheeler all won their events as nonscorers.

At the Commonwealth Games in Australia Julian Goater won bronze at 10,000m. The Club was also represented by Sarah Owen, Trevor Llewelyn and Carson Porteous.

OUAC, CUAC AND ACHILLES IN 1997

CUAC President Rob Trezona remembers:

The 1997 Varsity Match was the second to be held at the Cambridge Wilberforce Road track, and proved to be a good day for Cambridge, with wins in all 4 matches. This represented a full turnaround from 1996, when Oxford achieved the equivalent whitewash at Iffley Road. The competing teams had good knowledge of each other, many having competed together in an enjoyable but ultimately unsuccessful Americas tour earlier in the year. Oxford were considered to be strong favourites for the men's match, with the women's contest more finely balanced but favouring Cambridge. Former South Africa decathlon champion Pierre Faber had been a key athlete on tour, and other Oxford stars in included high jumper James Brierly and 400m runner Anders Lustgarten who were both pushing for international selection for English and GB teams.

Cambridge had their own talented multi-eventers in former GB decathlon champion Steve Rogers and heptathlete Rebecca Lewis. Steve had arrived at Cambridge not expecting to do any athletics due to a chronic lower back injury but was rejuvenated by treatment from former US Olympic physio and Athletics Weekly columnist Craig Benedict. Craig graciously made time for university athletes in his schedule, offering them a significant discount, and is remembered by many CUAC athletes as key to the 1997 victories.

The men's match proved to be a high quality and closely fought contest. The outstanding victory of the

day was Brierley's 2.20m in the high jump, a match and track record, which eclipsed Trever Llewelyn's 14year-old mark. The battle of the decathletes ended in Faber's favour with wins in the pole vault (4.40m), discus (45.42m) and shot (14.80m). Those who know Pierre will be impressed by the pole vault height for such a big man [a couple of years later he set a new shot put record of 16.75m]. Rogers won the javelin (61.10m) and a narrow victory in the 110mH, pipping Cambridge specialist Okeoghene Odudu with a dip at the line. The sprints also went Oxford's way, with Lustgarten leaving the 400m to Chas McCaw to take on Dave Gardiner over 100m and 200m. The 100m finish was incredibly close with both athletes record-

ing the same time of 11.0. Lustgarten was adjudged to have taken it, a decision with which even he disagreed, and he sportingly gave his winner's medal to Gardiner. The two clashed again over 200m, and were neck and neck until the final 30m, when Lustgarten's 400m endurance came into play, to record a fast 21.6. ing the same time of 11.0. Lustgarten was adjudged to ford's Ellen O'Hare (now Leggate) matched Trapmore's 800 and 1500m double, recording a new match record of 2:08.7 in the shorter distance. O was pushed hard in the 800m by Esther Casson, w recovered to record a victory of her own with a fi 400m in 59.6s. Cambridge women's team captair chel Stott followed her excellent form in the USA

A key feature of Cambridge's eventual victory were large personal bests from several less established athletes. James Trapmore won the Le Touquet Trophy for most improved performance in winning the middle distance double with huge pbs of 1:53.7 and 3:49.7. Cambridge also completed the clean sweep in the hurdles with a fine 25.0 for Odudu's first race in the 200mH and a breakthrough performance for Rob Osborne to win the 400mH, an event he had only picked up a few months before. Cambridge were also fortunate to unearth Barney Durrant, an English Schools hammer champion, in a chance conversation with me in the Magdalene bar a few weeks before the match. Durrant, who hadn't thrown for a couple of years, went on to win with an impressive 50.90m.

The women's match was also strongly impacted by a multi-eventer, in this case Lewis, whose 5 individual wins matched Jon Ridgeon's record from 1988. Ox-

ford's Ellen O'Hare (now Leggate) matched Trapmore's 800 and 1500m double, recording a new match record of 2:08.7 in the shorter distance. O'Hare was pushed hard in the 800m by Esther Casson, who recovered to record a victory of her own with a fine 400m in 59.6s. Cambridge women's team captain Rachel Stott followed her excellent form in the USA tour with a match record of 41.28m in the hammer. Future Olympic rower Sarah Winckless was also impressive, winning the discuss easily with 44.36m. The Alvestone v Centipede and Alligators v Millipede matches were comfortable victories for Cambridge, reflecting to some extent the inherent home advantage for second teams, but also strong efforts taken by CUAC over the year to widen participation and increase training squad sizes.

A highly enjoyable Blues dinner was held at Magdalene, in which Michael Beloff spoke of his own exploits in the Centipedes. The event followed the raucous example set by 1988 CUAC President Jon Ridgeon in landing 1997 CUAC president Trezona in trouble with College authorities, an outcome which he described as "worth it and entirely in the spirit of our venerable contest".

Andreas Fox was 1997 OUAC President:

That was a fun year! We had recently returned back from the joint Oxford/Cambridge tour of the Ivy League schools in the United States. Rob and I shared the captaincy of that team. I remember how it brought the two university teams closer together.

We learnt a lot from the Americans. They had significant investments in paid professional coaches, physiotherapist and facilities. Most of their funding was from strong alumni support.

I remember trying to find alumni of Oxford athletics to facilitate our finances. In that respect, I reached out to Sir Jeffrey Archer, who very kindly funded the team to fly to Antrim, which is where the National University championships were held that year. We were the only university team to have flown rather than taking long bus journeys which of course was preferable to the athletes. We achieved the highest placement at national level that year.

Another fundraising initiative was to get Steve Cram to come and do not only a training session with us, but also a question-and-answer session, for which we ticketed the event that sold very well.

I remember having a close working relationship with John De'Ath, our senior treasurer, who was in support of these activities to raise further funds to support the team. I also negotiated with View From, the kit manufacturer, a preferable deal for all of our clothing that year, which gave us great quality team clothing at affordable student prices.

Cambridge carried off the honours in the two University Cross-Country Races.

In the 46th Ladies' Race, the Light Blues lived up to their pre-race favourites tag by taking five of the first six places and winning by 29 points to 50. Niamh Bridson Hubbard (Magdalene) repeated her 2019 success to take the individual victory in a new record time for the course (which has been in use since 2000) of 22:30, taking 19 seconds off the previous mark set by her in 2019 and Julia Bleasdale (Pembroke) in 2003. Oxford now lead the series by 26 wins to 20.

The 131st Gentlemen's Race was a significantly closer affair, with the Light Blues emerging victors by the very narrow margin of 38 points to 40, the closest score since 1982. Going into the race carrying the favourites tag, they managed to withstand the loss to
